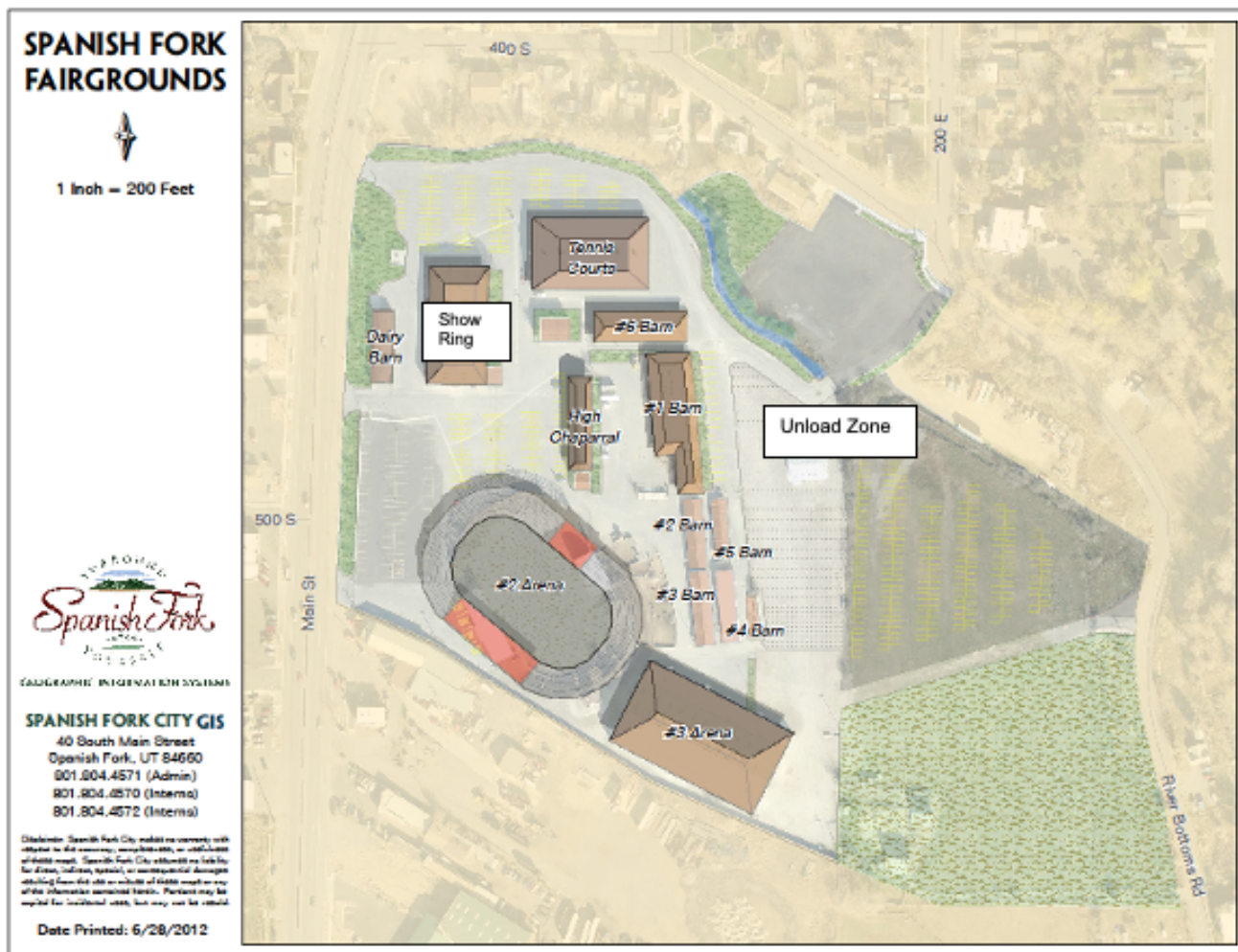

- The official entry form must be completed online at: [LINK](#)
- Please be sure to fill out the sections on the entry form or it will not process.
- Exhibitors can enter and show two steers, heifers, hogs, goats, and lambs and will receive premiums for one per division.
- All Market Animals Can Enter Ultrasound Carcass Contest
- All animals must remain on the show grounds until Sunday, August 6th

Sifting of Exhibits

- Animals not properly trained to handle will be sifted.
- The state vet will examine animals at check-in and those not meeting standards in the state rules will be sifted.
- The livestock committee reserves the right to sift any animal exhibiting unhealthy signs and symptoms due to health issues.
- Lambs and goats must be shorn to a 3/8 inch or less at the time of vet check.

Weighing of Exhibits

- The committee will weigh all animals during the designated time.
- All market animals will be classified by weight.
- Breeding heifers will be classified by birthdate.

RULES

Age: Exhibitors must be in the third grade, but not less than 8 years of age as of January 1 of the current year. Exceptions are made to those in the PEE WEE Division, who must be the age of 5 through school grade 2nd Grade.

Exhibitors can only show through the same season as their high school graduation, but not past their 19th birthday. Exception: Disabled persons as defined by public law 98-527. In these special cases, animals must still be the project animals of the exhibitor and cared for daily by the disabled person.

Group Affiliation: An exhibitor may enter a given show only as a 4-H or FFA member, but not both. Exhibitors must declare one or the other at the time of entry.

Ownership of the animal: The exhibitors will own, possess, feed and care for his/her project animal(s) for not less than 100 consecutive days for the market beef and 60 consecutive days for the market swine, market goats and market lambs immediately prior to the show they intend to participate in. No interruption of ownership or possession can occur. If an animal has been shown in a market show in state or out of state, it must be shown in the same exhibitor's name in all-subsequent shows.

Fitting on the fairgrounds: The fitting of animals will be areas designed by the livestock show committee. Parents, guardians, siblings, club leaders, Extension / 4-H agents and FFA advisors may assist, and are encouraged to assist the younger exhibitors. However, each exhibitor must be working with the project animal and be in attendance with that animal during the entire fitting process.

Code of Ethics (rules 5a through 5i) – The following practices or procedures are unacceptable in the care, fitting, preparation and showing of all classes of livestock. Any violation of association rules or specific rules as designated by individual fairs and livestock shows may result in forfeiture of premiums and awards, disqualification, and may result in probationary status and/or loss of eligibility for future participation in Association member shows. Possible civil penalties may be imposed by the proper authorities based on evidence provided by the livestock show of exhibitors in violation of the Federal Food, Drug and Cosmetic act/or the animal mistreatment, neglect, and abandonment laws that apply on the local, state, and national levels. Other member shows will be notified of any action taken by show management, which may affect the eligibility of the individual, group, or sponsoring organization for participation at other shows. The decision of the livestock show management will be final.

a. The use of any drug, tranquilizer, sedative, or depressant, which alters the psychological or physiological state of the animal, is illegal. Exceptions to this rule would be licensed, certified veterinarians, treatment for a recognized disease or injury, or recommendation for tranquilizing breeding animals in heat that might compromise the safety of others. The drugs must be approved by the Food and Drug Administration for use in meat producing animals. All exhibitors will advise show management of any drug and/or medication administered to an animal that might be detected at the time of showing or at meat inspection. The name of the drug, its purpose, the person who administered the drug, time, and date of administration will be

presented to show management prior to the showing and sale of the animals. Failure to report this information will result in severe penalty and/or disqualification. Any use of drugs or substances not approved by the Food and Drug Administration is strictly prohibited. All animals entered into livestock competition will be subject to testing for foreign substances that exceed acceptable levels established by the FDA, FSIS, USDA, or EPA. This includes any non-labeled feed additives or substances not approved for that species. During the livestock event, in the case of an animal requiring treatment, all medication shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian and the livestock show officials shall be notified. Use of an illegal drug is considered a premeditated act and any information obtained in the practice of illegal alteration of any animal will be turned over to the proper authorities for possible criminal prosecution.

b. Surgery, injection or insertion of foreign material under the skin and/or into the flesh of animal to change the natural contour, conformation, or appearance of an animal's body is illegal. This includes vegetable oil, silicon, or any other substance used to alter an animal's shape. Acceptable practices of physical preparations, which are allowed, include: clipping of hair, trimming of hooves, dehorning, or removal of ancillary teats.

c. Treating an animal internally or externally, with any irritant, counterirritant, or other substance used to artificially change the conformation or appearance of an animal for show is considered unethical, inhumane, and is prohibited. This includes, but is not limited to, the use of graphite, powders, hemp, artificial hair, coloring, common products such as fly spray, ointment, or liniment used to the point that it is irritating, or similar type products. Any liquid or substance not considered part of an accepted and normal diet for livestock is deemed illegal and inhumane. For example: the use of alcoholic or carbonated beverages as a drench or filler, etc. drenching will not be allowed unless the show veterinarian or a show official is present and is needed for emergency purposes only.

d. Each exhibitor has absolute responsibility for the care and condition of the animal(s) they enter and bring to the show.

e. The use of inhumane fitting, showing, and handling practices or devices shall not be tolerated. For example: breaking of tails, striking of the animal to cause swelling or for bracing purposes, use of an electrical contrivance, muzzles, etc. is not acceptable.

f. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited.

g. Market grand and reserve champion animals that pass through a sale, may be drug tested, at the discretion of the show.

h. At the time an animal is sold at auction at the livestock show, the exhibitors shall be held directly responsible for animals that are rejected at the processing center for any reason. The seller may be liable to the buyer for an amount equal to three times the purchase price and may also be liable for attorney's fees and civil penalties. Show management may share acceptable intelligence and evidence information with FDA

or USDA. If, for any reason, the FDA or USDA inspectors must remove any part of a meat animal carcass, the market price will be discounted.

i. Show management reserves the right to require animal health certificates. Health inspection and diagnostic tests may be made before or after animals are on the livestock show premises for exhibitor and animal safety, or to inaugurate disease control procedures which may become necessary in emergencies as determined by animal health officials..

Dress Code: A long or short sleeve shirt that fastens down the front with a collar is mandatory. Black or blue pants are to be worn. The following will not be allowed: T-shirts, tank tops, belly shirts, tube tops or short sleeveless shirts.

Lamb Docking Rule – Scientific research indicates that the incidence of rectal prolapsed is reduced when the tail is docked in a non-extreme manner. The recommended method is to dock at the distal end on the caudal fold (3rd caudal vertebra). Complete tail removal (extreme docking) is not an accepted sheep production practice and is discouraged for all Utah Junior Livestock sheep projects. Market lambs or breeding sheep showing any signs of contagious disease or current or recent signs of prolapsed, or with an open sore on the dock (rosebud), will be shifted at the discretion of the state show vet at the time of weigh in and their determination is final.

Name Change: If an animal has been shown in a market show in-state or out of state, it must be shown in the same exhibitor's name in all subsequent shows.

Drug Withdrawal: It is unethical and in most cases even unlawful to administer drugs to livestock within 20 to 30 days of slaughter. Animals too unmanageable to show should be withdrawn from their class rather than be tranquilized. The local show committee and the show veterinarian will monitor this situation. By federal regulations, random testing will occur at slaughter, and animals will be condemned which have been given an injection or oral dosage of tranquilizers, pain killers, antibiotics, diuretics, steroids, or other foreign substances during withdrawal periods before slaughter. All sales money will be withheld in such cases. Bloat medication and other medications with no withdrawal requirements may be permissible. **Exhibitors need to be aware of potential health hazards to consumers who eat animals that have received any above-mentioned dosages. Please do not put someone's life in jeopardy.**

Tagging: The extension/4-H agent, FFA advisor, or members of their appointed committees shall tag each animal and process the proper forms. Should a tag be lost or pulled out of the animal's ear, the exhibitor will advise the committee supervisor immediately so the tag can be replaced and the appropriate paperwork. **Animals tag number must match the number on entry form.**

Judging Contest & Test: Open to all summer agriculture FFA students and 4-H members in Utah County.

Animal Abuse: Animals are not to be abused. If any animal is being abused the animal and the exhibitor will be removed from the show and fairgrounds, upon committee's discretion.

Market Beef

Chairman: Garrick Liddiard

ALL EQUIPMENT & ANIMALS MAY NOT BE REMOVED UNTIL SUNDAY MORNING.

1. Market beef must weigh a minimum of 1000 lbs. show day to be eligible for the champion drive.
2. Premiums for the various grades will be prorated according to the number and quality of animals shown.
3. All market beef will be stalled in an area designed by the committee.
4. The original owner must exhibit any market beef exhibited at any previous show at this show.
5. Fitting equipment must be placed on the east side of the steer stalls.
6. Market Beef over 24 months of age will be sifted. If age is in question, a certified VET will determine the age by examining the animal's teeth. Steers may have no more than two permanent teeth, with all other teeth in place being baby teeth.
7. Each animal may only be shown in one division.
8. Generators are highly suggested as power is very limited.

Beef Fitting & Showmanship Contest

All exhibitors must use their own registered Market Hog for showmanship
All who participate in the Beef Fitting & Showmanship will receive an award.

Market Hogs

ALL EQUIPMENT & ANIMALS MAY NOT BE REMOVED UNTIL SUNDAY MORNING.

1. All market hogs must have a minimum weight of 215 lbs. to be eligible to compete in the champion drive. Hogs weighing less than 215 lbs. will be shown in a feeder class
2. All hogs must be washed and clipped before they are weighed for entry into the show. Hogs cannot be restrained on fairgrounds.
3. Exhibitors, including Peewees, must have their own tagged animal to participate in showmanship and market.
4. Peewees (Age 5 through school grade 2) are eligible for the Market Swine show.
5. Hogs will be classed by weight.
6. Premiums for the various grades will be prorated according to the number and quality of animals shown.
7. Participants are responsible for cleaning their own pens.

Market Hog Fitting & Showmanship Contest

All exhibitors must use their own registered Market Hog for showmanship with the exception of Class 5 - Mini.

Market Lambs

ALL EQUIPMENT & ANIMALS MAY NOT BE REMOVED UNTIL SUNDAY MORNING.

1. Market lambs must have a minimum weight of 100 lbs to be eligible for the champion drive.
2. Lambs must be shorn to a ¼ inch or less at the time of vet check.
3. Premiums for the various grades will be prorated according to the number and quality of lambs shown.
4. Market Lambs should not be older than 12 months. Lambs must have milk teeth in normal positions and have no permanent incisors erupted.
5. All market lambs will be stalled in an area designed by the committee.
6. Ewe Lambs must have an official Scrapie tag.
7. Wethers must be castrated prior to the show.
8. No muzzles are allowed on any lamb at any time.
9. Drenching is not allowed. Failure to comply will result in forfeiture of prize money/awards and removal from the show.
10. Exhibitors, including Peeweesees, must have their own tagged animal for showmanship and market. Peeweesees (Age 5 through school grade 2) are eligible for the Market Lamb show.
11. Participants are responsible for cleaning their own pens.

Market Lamb Fitting & Showmanship Contest

All exhibitors must use their own registered Market Lamb for showmanship with the exception of Class 5 - Mini.

Class 2 – School grades 9 and up – (Senior)

Class 3 – School grades 6, 7, 8 – (Intermediate)

Class 4 – School grades 3, 4, 5 – (Junior)

Market Goats

Chairman: Bryan Ottesen
Co-Chairman: Matt Blackhurst

ALL EQUIPMENT & ANIMALS MAY NOT BE REMOVED UNTIL SUNDAY MORNING.

1. Market Goats must have a minimum weight of 45 lbs. to be entered into the show.
2. Doe Goats must have an official Scrapie tag.
3. Market Goats should not be older than 12 months. Goats must have milk teeth in normal positions and have no permanent incisors erupted.
4. Wethers must be castrated prior to the show.
5. Goats will be required to be either disbudded or have horns tipped prior to the show. No sharp points will be allowed.
6. Goats should be shorn uniformly $\frac{3}{8}$ " or less above the knees and the hocks.
7. Wether and doe kids will be shown together. Classes will be divided based on weight.
8. All Market Goats will be stalled in an area designated by the committee.
9. Premiums for the various market grades will be prorated according to the number and quality of Market Goats shown.
10. Peewees (age 5 through School Grade 2) are eligible for the Market Goat show.
11. No muzzles are allowed on any goat at any time.
12. Exhibitors, including Peewees, must have their own tagged animal for showmanship and market.
13. Participants are responsible for cleaning their own pens.

Market Goat Fitting & Showmanship Contest

All exhibitors must use their own registered Market Goat for showmanship with the exception of Class 5 - Mini.

Class 2 – School grades 9 and up – (Senior)

Class 3 – School grades 6, 7, 8 – (Intermediate)

Class 4 – School grades 3, 4, 5 – (Junior)

Breeding Heifers

Chairman: Shane Sorensen

All major registered breeds and commercial heifers

ALL EQUIPMENT & ANIMALS MAY NOT BE REMOVED UNTIL SUNDAY MORNING.

1. Exhibitors may exhibit two heifers.
2. The following information must be specified for each animal on the online entry form to be eligible to show: breed, sex, birthdate, tattoo, and registration number (*if registered*). Animals registered must include on the form its sire and dam, as it appears on the registration papers.
3. Both registered and commercial heifers will be shown together.
4. All animals must arrive and be checked into the fair by the breeding committee on Wednesday by 7:00 pm. to facilitate the breakdown of classes. **No exceptions.**
5. Animals must be completely groomed and ready for show when entering the arena.
6. Unruly animals may be excused from the show ring.

Breeding Heifer Class Breakdown

Heifers (Open and Bred) – Heifers will be separated into classes based on age. If the committee determines that sufficient numbers from individual breeds are entered, classes may be separated by breed.

Pee-Wee Exhibitors

Pee-Wee Exhibitors must be at least the age of 5 and school grade no higher than 2nd.

Pee-Wee's are allowed to participate in exhibiting animals in both market evaluation and showmanship.

Pee-Wee's are expected to follow and adhere to all rules outlined above.

NEW Mini Showmanship

We are happy to have the youngest generation enter the Show Ring in our Mini Showmanship. Mini Showmanship is for those of ages 4 and under who want to show a lamb, goat or hog.

Mini Showmanship will be held immediately following the Junior division (Class 4) of Showmanship after each species as 'Class 5'.

Mini Showmen **do not** have to be registered with their own animal to participate.

Ultrasound Carcass Contest

\$5 entry fee at the time of Ultrasound

The Ultrasound Carcass Contest uses high-frequency sound waves to display images of muscle and fat under a living animal's hide. The ultrasound will be judged on the quality and quantity of the product.

All Market Animals that are registered in the show are eligible to compete in the Carcass Contest.

Awards & results will be presented at the ice cream social.
